Executive Director Albert Pugh to attend Kairos at St. Clair Prison October 26-29

Kairos Prison Ministry International, Inc. (Kairos) is a lay-led, interdenominational Christian ministry in which men and women volunteers bring Christ's love and forgiveness to prisoners and their families.

The word, *Kairos*, is a Greek word meaning in "God's Special Time" or in the "Fullness of Time," indicating an opportunity for our participants and guests to reconsider their life choices.

The Kairos programs take the participants on a journey that demonstrates the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. Kairos Prison Ministry is Christian in nature, although no religious affiliation is necessary to be a participant.

The programs involve a structured model that includes the weekend experience, followed by guests or participants gathering regularly for accountability, support, and prayer.

Executive Director Albert Pugh will be going into St. Clair October 26 -29, 2023. Albert is very excited about going back into where he was once incarcerated and serving on the Kairos #71 team. If you remember Albert's Testimony from the July issue of Footprints, Albert said this:

"I heard about a ministry called Kairos and decided to sign up for this weekend event because they bring good food, cookies, coffee and lemonade. When I was released back to general population I signed up and was chosen to go. It was during that weekend, that I experienced the love of God in an overwhelming way!

Afterwards I knew 2 things:

- *That God is real. I had prayed before and was raised to believe, but He was never real in my life before this! I had done these things for selfish reasons.*
- *God loves me.*

I wasn't able to make a commitment at the time, but 6 weeks later, the words I heard that weekend still burning in my heart and mind, I knew I needed to talk to God. I needed to explain to Him all the reasons I could not become a Christian in a maximum-security prison. Just like Moses, I gave God my long list of reasons, yet after our talk, all these things didn't seem to matter, and I made a commitment to Christ on December 31, 1984.

For the next 25 years I studied and literally experienced Romans 12:1,2 where Paul said. "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Rom. 12:2 NRSV).

We rejoice with Albert as he goes back into St. Clair as a living testimony and true demonstration of the awesome love of God. Let all God's people say together, Hallelujah!

The Life of a CREA Board Member

How did you become involved with CREA and the Bryan Clay House?

I have had a longstanding relationship with Mr. Albert Pugh, the Executive Director. My initial encounter with him was in 1996 when he was involved in the KAIROS prison ministry program. Bob Burgess and Dr. George Lyrene, fellow KAIROS members, invited me to an event at the St. Clair Facility where Albert was based. This marked the beginning of my involvement with what later developed into CREA and the Bryan Clay House. The entire KAIROS team supported Albert's release and shared his vision of establishing a place like the Bryan Clay House. We were all familiar with Fresh Start Ministry, similar to CREA today, which guided our understanding of Albert's program, aligning with its current form.

What is your vision as Chairman of the Board and as a CREA Board Member for furthering the mission for the men at the Bryan Clay House?

As Chairman of the CREA Board and a member, my vision involves continuing to reach out to those in greatest need, addressing the inherent inequities within the system that hinder recovery and full reintegration into society. I'm committed to aiding young men aspiring to transform their lives by providing ongoing support in their faith journey. Considering our current property, I envision potential partnerships with local medical institutions to offer mental health care. Additionally, I aim for CREA to transition from short-term assistance to a more sustained approach, fostering lasting change and forward-thinking among those in need. Our Board is composed of diverse backgrounds including a doctor, retired school principal, financial expert, and retired probation officer. While acknowledging gaps in our expertise, our primary focus presently is community education and overcoming obstacles.

What opportunities do you see for the community and others to become involved in the Bryan Clay House?

Numerous opportunities exist for the community to engage with the Bryan Clay House. Reflecting on our shared humanity, we must ask ourselves if we're exhibiting Christ-like love and contributing positively. Recognizing that these men will eventually be part of our lives, we should embrace the communal duty to assist them. Our personal contributions may vary, but the profound impact on us while helping these men is undeniable. Although not every participant succeeds on their initial attempt, the Bryan Clay House offers a space to rebuild confidence and character, pivotal to achieving success.

What would you want others to know about the Bryan Clay House?

The Bryan Clay House stands as a vital community resource for anyone, including those in our own families, who find themselves on the wrong path in life. We are dedicated to uplifting and empowering individuals within our community, fostering character and self-assurance where and when it is needed most.

Meet Our New House Manager

Before you became the House Manager, you were once a resident at the Bryan Clay House. What was your experience while being a resident at the Bryan Clay House?

I experienced freedom, but in a structured environment that helped me begin to take steps forward instead of backward. I also found a brotherhood, who shared my triumphs and my struggles and walked with me through them. I was also impacted by a caring staff, who were not only concerned about my well-being, but also helped me set realistic goals and plans that were both attainable and achievable.

And now that you are the House Manager, how has that experience shaped how you do things now?

It has kept me mindful of others and that I want to help others as they have helped me. I will not forget all that God has done for me; nor will I take for granted the grace and mercy He has shown me and has brought me to this next chapter of my life. It is very important to me that I share this hope in my daily life, so that I can be an example to others that God does not give up on His people. I am living testimony that God is faithful and that He is always in pursuit of His people. I was once one of those lost sheep that the Bible talks about and I am so glad that He left the ninety-nine to come rescue me. How could I not also have that same heart for others, especially for the men at the Bryan Clay House? This is why I do what I do now.

What are your responsibilities as the House Manager?

I am responsible for the overall running of the House and the upkeep of the outside property. One of my main duties is to work hand in hand with the residents, to encourage them, to challenge them, and to do my best to do everything I can to help them be successful. I oversee the weekly church and group meetings, assist with the orientation for new residents, keep track of our bed roster, and oversee our drug screening for all residents. I work very closely with the other staff members to ensure that the House runs as smoothly as possible. There are a lot of moving pieces, so I am grateful for both the staff and the residents. We are all working together to make the Bryan Clay House a good place for men to move forward.

What is the one thing that you often share with the residents of the Bryan Clay House?

The one thing that I share with them is to not give up. Things may not always turn out like you want them to, but if you keep pushing your way through, you will eventually get your breakthrough. I would not be where I am today had I given up. I have had to press my way through some things to get to the other side, and I am so glad I did. It was worth the struggle!

And what would you want others to know about the Bryan Clay House?

At the Bryan Clay House it is like an extended family. When the men get off work, they can come to the House to a hot meal and fellowship with the other men in the House. They work hard each day; and though their days can be challenging, it is comforting to be able to look around you and see that you are not alone. That is what I want people to know about the Bryan Clay House. You are not alone.

Another fond memory I have is watching my father rebuild old cars. One of my favorite cars that my dad restored and completely rebuilt, was a 1965 Porsche 912 during my teenage years. I am not exaggerating when I say, that it was a thing of beauty when he finished. In fact, after much begging and pleading, he let me drive that Porsche to my junior prom. And I promise you, that you couldn't tell me that I wasn't hot stuff driving that car!

Unfortunately for me, I just was not born with this knack of being able to build anything, fix anything, and put it back together better than it was before. As much as my father would have liked me to, I just do not think this way. But what I did inherit was his dogged determination to never look at a problem as something that was unsolvable or could not be overcome. I love the challenge of figuring out how to puzzle out a problem and then finding a solution.

Which brings me to the point I want to make in this article. I really don't mind being in this season and time, puzzling out where the Lord is leading me. I know that He is the ultimate wisdom giver, who is always able to make a way, when there seems to be no solution to the problem. I am confident that the Lord will give me direction. I am confident that the season and time I am in is in God's perfect timing and in accordance with His plans and purposes for my life. I am also confident that the wisdom and determination the Lord and my dad have imparted into me will continue to inspire me to overcome and find a solution to anything I am confronted with. And lastly, I am fully persuaded that I will see my dad again and that my dad is in heaven soaking up knowledge in the everlasting arms of his heavenly Father, who is the Ultimate Wisdom Giver. 
